We're hopeful we can worship together in person in ways that keep us both safe and connected.

A WORD FROM KORY

I'm excited to share with you that I have a new address! I'm renting the home at 912 Carneal Road (40505) on the north side of Lexington, near the new Greyline Station. My fiancée Amy will begin to slowly move her things in over the summer as she makes trips to visit and will officially move in after the wedding on August 14. I'd love to have you stop by and visit!

This marks my fourth zip code in 17 months and the first time I've truly felt at home since I left my previous house in September 2019. I've lived in another person's house and an apartment, but while I appreciated having a roof over my head and a bed to sleep in, neither place truly felt like home. Couple that with the upheaval of the pandemic, and I have experienced in powerful ways what it means to feel displaced.

I've not only been displaced from home but also from the church. Once we decided to work from home, my office became where I lived. The place I looked to for comfort and connection – the sanctuary – suddenly became a constant reminder of the casualty of the pandemic. The one place we should feel safe to gather no longer was safe. Instead of preaching to my church family on Sunday morning, I preached to a video camera on Thursday afternoon. Church no longer felt like home to me.

All that changes May 2 as we return to in-person worship. We were able to do this safely and successfully on Easter, and words cannot describe how good it felt that morning to look out and see your shining, happy faces again. After a year of exile, we were home again! And now, God willing, we will be back in church each Sunday, rekindling our connections and reviving our weary souls. Just as I have now moved into a place that I can call home (at least for a few years), as a congregation, we will be coming home.

As nice as it will be to worship in person on Sunday morning, I don't want to put too much weight on what is



taking place. I've talked to a few people who've wondered when church

was going to "open" again, and I've tried to gently remind them that church never closed. Yes, we weren't able to worship together on Sunday morning, but we never stopped being the church. We still worshipped, enjoyed fellowship, learned, and served, we just did it in new ways. As our church signs reminded us, Crestwood worships "here" (wherever that is for you) and serves everywhere. So, on May 2, the church isn't re-opening; we are simply adapting once again to the circumstances in which we live.

As we negotiated the pandemic, we followed in the footsteps of a long line of God's people who had to adapt their faith to fit changing circumstances. When the Israelites were cast into exile by the Babylonians, they didn't just stop worshipping God. They adapted, finding new ways to praise God in a foreign land. When the wise men learned that King Herod was upset with them, they saw the baby Jesus then went home by another way. When the temple of Jerusalem was destroyed in 70 CE, God's people found other ways and places to worship. As followers of Christ, we are in good company with other believers down through the centuries who have adapted their faith in light of their circumstances.

Now, as we prepare to come back together, we do so as fellow travelers on this strange and unpredictable journey. We are not the same people we were last March, and I believe we're still figuring out how we've changed and what's next. Who knows? We might be exiled again in a few weeks or months. Regardless of what happens, we can find solace in the fact that home is not necessarily a place, but it is what we feel when we are safe in God's arms. That can be in an apartment or a rented home or a sanctuary. They say, "Home is where the heart is." I think home is wherever God is. And it is so good to be home!

TRISH TALK

Dear Friends,

I hope you are well and enjoying the warmer weather. Being outside more has me more aware of many things:

*The renewal of creation. No matter how tough the winter weather, spring comes. (When winter interrupts, spring returns with a bit of summer to balance things out. •••) I'm reminded that the One who ordered the chaos and brought this world into being, also breathed life into us. We too can persevere through the dormant season of life trusting "spring" to come.

*Out of the biggest messes and the hardest work comes the most beauty. When I bought my house I inherited a beautiful brick patio. The person who made it had access to the bricks from old buildings being torn down. He brought these old bricks, many stamped with the names of their maker, and created a patio. New life for old bricks. (Seeing the stamped bricks I often ask what I do to show the name of my maker.)

But here is the thing, all of his work gets overtaken by weeds if I'm not vigilant. Which honestly I'm not. Then the real effort had to kick in. Getting the weeds out of the cracks and crevasses is difficult. I don't like to use chemicals and they are tenacious. So once a spring, out comes the pressure washer. I blast the weeds from the cracks along with all of the dirt and sand. What a mess! Sweeping, weed preventer application, more sweeping, and finally, new sand is put down. All is hosed off. I sit and nurse my aching body; I have a beautiful patio once again. And I make a promise to myself to keep up with the weeds. While working on this my mind wandered to all the areas of our world that are a mess and need the hard work to bring out the beauty.

*We need neighbors—both the folks that live around us literally and the "neighbors" with whom we share this time on earth. We need people. And as I Christian I am commanded to love them. I was struggling to load mulch bags from a flat bed trolly into my SUV. The parking lot was on a slant. I'd picked up a bag and the trolly would roll. A dozen people walked by before a very nice person stopped. I just needed someone to hold the trolly. I was doing the heavy lifting. We need each other. Sometimes someone just needs a hand to hold while they do the heavy lifting in their own life. (My parking lot neighbor came equipped with giant muscles and insisted I hold the trolly. I said, "You are so kind. Thank you. " His response was, "That's what we are all supposed to be—kind—right?") There over mulch two "neighbors" who were opposite from one another in everything that appeared on the outside shared a glimpse of the beauty of what it means to love your neighbor.

May the warmer weather and the renewal of spring feed your soul.

WHY CAN'T WE SING?

Like the Psalmists in Babylonian exile, our tongues have been silenced. How can we sing the Lord's song in this strange land that we call Covid-19? We are devoted to leading the people of God as they lift their voices in song, and we are saddened that we cannot sing in worship right now. But we respect the wisdom of experts who have warned of the high risks associated with public singing during the Covid-19 pandemic. We believe that current measures to restrict singing—as much as we might lament them—are in the best interest of the church and world at this time.

Why is singing so dangerous, you may ask? In a study conducted by an expert panel assembled by the National Association of Teachers of Singing, the American Choral Directors Association, Chorus America, the Barbershop Harmony Society, and the Performing Arts Medical Association, it was found that even with multiple changes of air per hour the virus is not fully eliminated and can infect people from as far as 16 feet. There are also no barriers currently safe for singing. An N95 mask may provide

some measure of safety if fittested, but studies showed that influenza patients who sat in masks for half an hour without coughing and simply spoke only a few sentences shed influenza



virus from their breath in fine particles that escaped their masks. Singing is riskier than speaking because when you sing, you expel air forcefully which generates more respiratory aerosols that could contain the Covid-19 virus.

We will continue to monitor local Covid-19 positivity rates, anecdotal information from churches in Lexington and around the country, and recommendations from the CDC as we make plans for in-person worship in a manner that will keep everyone as safe as possible. As more people become fully vaccinated, it should be possible to ease some of the restrictions that are currently in place. We can't wait to get back to singing the hymns of our faith as we worship together!


CHILDCARE CENTER FUNDRAISER
