

#### A WORD FROM KORY



I once worked for a senior pastor, Nelson Irving, who was simply beloved by everyone who knew him. One day I asked him how he managed to stay out of conflict and maintain such good relationships with his congregation. His response? "I never talk about politics or religion."

Unfortunately, we pastors can't avoid talking about religion, but should we avoid talking about politics? That's a loaded question these days as we get closer to the 2024 election. More than ever, I feel the anxiety of my peers as we all try to figure out our role in helping our congregations navigate the treacherous waters of this contentious political season. Should we be prophetic or pastoral? The line between the two is razor thin and the opportunity for missteps is plentiful.

In past election seasons I've addressed the political climate in varying degrees. In 2016 I preached a sermon series called "Promises, Promises," in which I compared the promises of the candidates (Donald Trump and Hillary Clinton) with the promises of God in the Bible. In 2020 I didn't address politics at all until the Sunday before the election, when I preached a sermon called "How to Vote" and then followed the election with a sermon titled, "What Now?" I'm still employed here, so I must not have ruffled too many feathers.

Every election season carries a certain level of urgency, and this year is no different. What IS different is the level of conflict and division that exists in our country. The chasm between supporters of Harris and Trump seems wider than ever, and poor undecideds are caught in the middle. The emotions are high, the language is incendiary, and the future is unclear. What's a preacher to say?

I've asked that question of a couple groups within the church and will be doing so with the Elders at our September meeting. What do you want to hear from the pulpit in the weeks leading up to the election? I've heard everything from "Stay away from anything political" to "address head-on the issues that will motivate voters." Yikes! Is there a third option? Well, there is: "Preach the gospel" (that's always by goal, by the way).

In a way, the Disney sermon series this summer was a light-hearted palate cleanser for this fall. Starting September 8, we'll dive into the letter of James to learn what he says about how we live out our faith in very practical ways (both in and out of political seasons). Then, starting October 20, I'll preach... something...leading up to the election on November 5. I have not decided what that will be, but I expect it to land somewhere between the two extremes named above. I pray you hear the gospel in those sermons, and I invite you to pray for me as I prepare them.

Those won't be the only ways you will be invited to be in conversation with me and each other about how we live out our faith in a conflicted world. In September I'll be offering a book study on the Bible and politics (see page 4), and our Shalom Team is working on a series of conversations with community leaders around social justice issues in our community. Stay tuned for more information on those. Finally, on Monday, November 4, we'll be offering an Election Eve prayer service, where we can all come together and share with God our hopes, dreams, concerns, and fears about the events of the next day.

There's a lot I don't know about the coming months, but what I DO know is that God is there waiting for us. We are the body of Christ and are called to be the salt of the earth as we seek to live out Christ's peace and grace. That call will be challenged in the months ahead, which is all the more reason to recommit ourselves to living more like Jesus each and every day. I pray we stay connected to God and each other as we strive to be Christ's church in this time.





#### SRO TRIP TO MAYSVILLE, KY ON FRIDAY, SEPTEMBER 13 - ALL ADULTS ARE WELCOME!

Get ready for a busy, informative, and fun day of history, art, culture, and, of course, food! We will start by traveling to Maysville and boarding a trolley for a narrated tour of both Maysville and Washington. We will return to Maysville and have lunch at a choice of spots near the Gateway Museum Center and Gift Shop:

A Sprinkle of Hope is a sandwich/soup/salad shop that employs special needs citizens to prepare and serve their delicious food. Kenton Stories is a book store and restaurant with unique books and gifts that you can browse while waiting for your lunch to be served. After lunch at your leisure, browse the Gateway Museum Center and Gift Shop, which showcases three dynamic collections in one building, bringing all the stories of the region into fascinating focus. The Museum is also home to one of the largest miniature collections in the nation, the KSB Miniatures Collection.

Time permitting, we may venture into an Old Pogue Experience, including the Pogue Bourbon History Museum and tasting room, which is located next door to the Gateway Museum. If we still have more time, we can stroll through the downtown area and browse the unique shops and businesses.

Maysville is on the Ohio River, at the edge of the outer Bluegrass Region. Frontiersmen <u>Simon Kenton</u> and <u>Daniel Boone</u> are among the city's founders about 1775. Maysville became an important port on the Ohio River for the northeastern part of the state. It exported bourbon whiskey, hemp, and tobacco, the latter two produced mainly by <u>African American</u> slaves before the Civil War. Maysville was an important stop on the Underground Railroad, as the <u>free state</u> of <u>Ohio</u> was just across the river.

**Washington** was established in 1786 by the Virginia Legislature, six years before Kentucky became a state. By 1790 it had grown to 119 log cabins, the second largest town in Kentucky. After separating from Bourbon County in 1788, Washington became the county seat of Mason County, which included nearly one-fourth of the area of Kentucky. In 1792 Kentucky was admitted to the Union as the fifteenth state, and many Westerners hoped that the thriving little city, with its 119 log cabins, would be the capital of the United States. By 1797 Washington was the glowing center of education and fashion. Visitors from Lexington and surrounding settlements came here to shop. There were twenty flourishing mercantile houses, two taverns (inns), ten mechanics shops, three rope walks, and three churches. Today Washington offers antique shops, restaurants, and a unique look at years gone by.
