2024 STEWARDSHIP CAMPAIGN IMAGINE TOGETHER

"Look at the birds of the air, they neither sow nor reap nor gather into barns, and yet your heavenly Father feeds them. Are you not of more value than they?" - Matthew 6:26

In the Gospel of John, Nicodemus, a Pharisee, has many questions for Jesus about his teachings. Initially criticized by Jesus, Nicodemus gradually evolves into a vibrant follower. His narrative highlights the importance of spiritual curiosity in maintaining vitality and addressing the



tendency to fear change. How could a commitment to curiosity be transformative for us? What if we did less worrying and more imagining?

Nicodemus encourages us to continue to question how our curiosity and willingness to grow and change can transform each of us, our church, our community, and the world. If we want not only to imagine but experience vitality, all we need to do is steward our natural God-given curiosity. Stewardship is not just about financial contributions. It's about faith in action.

On September 29 Crestwood kicked off our fall Stewardship Campaign. This is the time of year we pledge our gifts that allow the leaders of Crestwood to plan for operating costs, programming, and ministry for the following year. It is a crucial part of the life of the church. Specifically for 2025, our goals include increasing our outreach giving, growing our community-focused ministries (Fellowship, Children, Youth, Senior Adults), and making sure our hard-working staff are adequately compensated. A WORD FROM KORY



What are you afraid of? When I was a kid, the answer to that question was simple: snakes, heights, homework. But as an adult living in today's world, that answer is much more complex, because there are many more things to be afraid of, and the fears are intensified by the culture around us.

In his book, <u>The Witness of Religion in the Age of Fear</u>, theologian Michael Kinnamon addresses the culture of fear that has taken over our collective psyche. He says that, historically, the mood of our country has been confidence, bordering on arrogance. But now, he says, the prevailing mood is fear. He quotes a reporter who wrote, "The country has regressed into an angry, defensive crouch." A quick perusal of a newspaper or any social media site would confirm this.

As you can guess, this goes against much of what the Bible has to say about fear. One of the most common refrains in scripture is, "Do not be afraid." To be fearful in the Bible was seen as a lack of faith and trust in God's provision and protection. To fear God was one thing; to be fearful of the circumstances as life was quite another. Our fears tend to make us turn inward for self-protection, while the Bible calls us to reach out beyond ourselves to care of others, including the stranger and the foreigner.

When we are fearful, we tend to worry more, because there appears to be more threats to our safety and security. But Jesus is clear when he says in Matthew 6, "Do not worry," citing that the God who takes care of the birds of the air and the lilies of the field also takes care of us. Worry and fear go hand-in-hand, and both go against our call to move forward in faith.

I believe the opposite of fear and worry is imagination. When we're afraid, we don't allow ourselves to dream about what might be because we're too busy worrying about what could happen. Worry and fear suppresses our God-ordained creativity to imagine what God is doing with us, through us, and in us.

Our 2024 stewardship theme is "Imagine Together." We are inviting you to imagine what God can do through Crestwood in 2025 as we seek to continue connecting people to God and each other. God is already at work here, doing amazing things as we open ourselves up to God's leading. We continue to wel-

come new members into our church family, we are seeing more children and youth each week, and our bonds of connection are growing stronger through our fellowship events and worship services. We are continuing to reach beyond our walls through our outreach work, both in dollars and in hands-on service. Lives are being changed through our commitment to serving God.

With everything going so well, imagine what more God can do through us! "Us" is the key word there. One person can imagine a lot of things, but when we combine our collective imaginations together, we can do so much more! When we give to support the work of Crestwood in 2025, we are imagining together our future and committing ourselves to make it happen.

This year more than ever, your pledge is crucial to Crestwood's ability to fulfill its mission. These are financially challenging times, and for many the future is uncertain. It's tempting to retreat to a posture of fear and worry. Will we have enough? It's so easy to let our minds be controlled by a mentality of scarcity.

One of the ways we do that is through our church family. Every single pledge is important to helping us meet our goal in 2025. Your pledge is a tangible way for you to put your faith in God into action.

Thank you, Crestwood, for your generosity. Through you, we have been able to accomplish far more than we ever thought. I know lives will continue to be changed, people will continue to be welcomed, children and youth will continue to grow in faith, and all of us will continue to be connected to God and each other. We have come so far together! What does God have in store for us in 2025? Just imagine!

SRO TRIP TO MAYSVILLE, KY!

We had a wonderful trip to Maysville and Old Washington on Friday, September 13. The weather was clear and enjoyable, as the rain ended once we left Lexington and the day warmed up by afternoon. We all enjoyed the trolley tour of downtown Maysville, the five-mile ride to Old Washington, and lunch afterward at a day-old restaurant sponsored by the local college and staffed by college students. The menu was different (no sandwiches and only one soup), but everyone enjoyed their food!

After lunch we went to the Gateway Museum, where we spent time browsing the collection of miniature houses, furnished rooms, street scenes, and scenes from Hans Christian Anderson stories and Walt Disney movies. Included was a large reproduction of the Catherine Palace in St. Petersburg, Russia, an example of a special building exhibited once every four years. The reproduction of the Spencer House in London, England, was on display, accompanied by a video describing the mansion in great detail. Spencer House was the childhood home of Princess Diana.

The history section of the Museum represented all the years in the development and growth of America. Included was a visit to Maysville by Lafayette in 1825 and a display of documents, records, and pictures of Rosemary Clooney, who was from Maysville. All the history exhibits were thoughtfully planned and displayed.

NOTES FROM THE ADMINISTRATIVE BOARD

The Administrative Board met on Wednesday, September 18. Here are some highlights of what was accomplished:

- The Board received the Treasurer's report, which included a continued reduction of the pledge deficit. The deficit that started the year at over \$45,000 is down to \$7,000, thanks to an increase in giving. In addition, we have collected over \$2000 more in loose offering (money put into the offering plate) than anticipated. Thank you, Crestwood, for your generosity!
- The Board appointed the members of the Strategic Planning process, which will begin soon. They are: Laura Bryan (chair,), Rebecca Anderson, Libby Wachtel, Bob Shanklin, John Hatfield, Connie Guilfoil, Karen Blakeman, and David Richard. Amy Wheeler (vice-moderator) and Kory will serve as ex-officio.
- The Board approved three distributions from the newly named Mildred F. Cox Memorial Fund. The recipients are Christian Church Communities (\$100,000), Lexington Rescue Mission (\$100,000), and New Life Day Center (\$24,000).

MILDRED F. COX ENDOWMENT FUND

In June of 2022 Crestwood Christian Church received the first installment of what was ultimately a \$1,770,000 bequest from Mildred Farr Cox's estate. Mildred faithfully served Crestwood as church librarian and generously, albeit quietly, supported Crestwood financially during her lifetime. While Crestwood previously had a small endowment fund that supplemented the annual operating budget by about \$14,000 per year, the Administrative Board approved formation of an Endowment Committee to manage these new funds and develop policies around their use.

The Endowment Committee selected two financial management firms with which to invest these funds. The Administrative Board had previously approved retaining 10% of the bequest for use for some much-needed property repairs. In consideration of the impact a gift of this size could make in the community and with Crestwood Christian Church's self-identifying as a church with a strong focus on outreach, the Endowment Committee recommended a policy, approved by the Administrative Board in September of 2022, that would direct growth from this investment to be used for Outreach projects, specifically those in excess of \$20,000.

The reality of these decisions now brings us to the point where Crestwood Christian Church has the opportunity to be a difference maker in our community. The growth in the funds now exceeds \$500,000 above the initial investment. The Local and World Outreach Committees released a grant application to known Crestwood mission partners in late spring of 2024. Of those responding, three agencies met the grant application criteria and were recommended for funding. At the September 2024 Administrative Board meeting the Board approved the following:

- 1. Officially naming this fund the MILDRED F. COX ENDOWMENT FUND
- 2. Funding grants to:
 - a. Lexington Rescue Mission \$100,000 towards constructing a kitchen and dining room in the new Community Center.
 - b. New Life Day Center \$24,000 for construction of a new check-in area at the center.
 - c. Christian Care Communities \$100,000 towards their capital campaign goal of \$2,000,000 for infrastructure for Phase II of The Homeplace at Midway, a senior living community.

Mildred F. Cox has given Crestwood a wonderful opportunity to build upon Crestwood's strong history of outreach. What a joy it is to be able to provide for the community in such a significant way! I look forward to the ways that Crestwood Christian Church can continue to live out our Vision and Mission by connecting People to God and Each Other and serving our community.

ANOTHER SUCCESSFUL MISSION BUILDING TRIP TO WESTERN KENTUCKY!

Seven Lexington Disciples of Christ church members volunteered in a successful mission building trip to Western Kentucky September 8 through September 13, 2024. The trip's purpose was to help rebuild after the tornados of December 10, 2021, and May 26, 2024. Crestwood and its World Outreach Committee helped sponsor the trip. Crestwood's volunteers were John Brown and Steve Seithers. We stayed at a wonderful church, the First Presbyterian Church in Madisonville, Kentucky. Under the leadership of the Fuller Disaster Rebuilders, we were able to work on two houses, both near Earlington, Kentucky.

The first house we called the "Hummingbird House", as the owner had two hummingbird feeders, which we kept filled and with amazement watched the birds come and go! Mrs. Delong had lost a carport during the 2021 tornado. Instead of rebuilding the carport, she asked us to rebuild a bedroom floor that was falling in. We replaced the floor joists, glued and screwed down the OSB floor sheeting, and finished it off with laminate flooring and wooden baseboard. We also installed laminate flooring and baseboard in the living room, kitchen, and hallway.

The other house we called "The Millhouse", as, after the 2021 tornado, the owner, Mr. Sprallin, had bought a sawmill and, by trial and error, had learned to mill his own lumber! He has 330 acres of property and he used the trees that fell during the tornado to supply his sawmill. His dining room had been destroyed by the tornado. He rebuilt the dining room but was unable to finish it, as a couple of months ago he stepped into a mole hole and had to have a full right knee replacement. Mr. Sprallin asked us to install a laminate floor and cedar baseboard, with the cedar coming from his milled cedar tree lumber. The walls were covered in cedar lumber, making it feel as if you were in a cedar chest! It definitely had that wonderful cedar fragrance.

What joy and fun we had in fellowship and in working to help others! This was our group's fifth trip to this area. We plan to go back April 27 through May 2, 2025. Mark your calendars and consider going with us! It will take several years to rebuild Western Kentucky. But, thanks to Crestwood and other volunteers, we are making a start!

EVER WONDERED ABOUT THE BRIDGE FUND? By Steph Wallace

Local Outreach allocates a portion of its monthly budget to the Bridge Fund, which is a fund used exclusively to assist our brothers and sisters in the community who need help paying their rent, electric bill, gas bill, or water bill. Here is how it works:

When a person calls asking for assistance, they either speak to me if I am in the office or I call them back the same day when they leave a message. When I speak with the person, I gather all the information I can about their situation, including why they need assistance, to whom they pay their bill or rent, and how much it is. I also obtain personal identifying information about the person.

Next, I send an email to Sheri Shaver, who checks this information against a database maintained by ROSM (Resource Office for Social Ministry). Everyone who has received assistance from a participating local church is entered into this database. Sheri checks to see whether the person has received assistance before, and, if so, when and which church provided it. The general rule is that a person can receive help from Crestwood only once in a six month period, because the Bridge Fund is designed to be a bridge to help a person or family get over a temporary situation that caused them to fall behind in their bills. After Sheri has checked the database, we contact the landlord or utility company to check everything the person told us about their account and the financial need, as well as their payment history. Once we have verified all their information, we use the money in our Bridge Fund account to pay the bill directly, never paying the individual person. A record of our assistance is then entered into the ROSM database. We generally limit Bridge payments to \$300 for any one person, unless there are special circumstances. Each case is considered very carefully and prayerfully, as we want to do the most good that we can with the limited resources we have.

Between January 1 and August 31 of 2024, our Bridge Fund has provided the following assistance:

Rent: \$2,119 to help 9 different people Electric: \$2,767 to help 14 different people Gas: \$419 to help 3 different people Water: \$888 to help 8 different people

Your giving to Crestwood is making a huge difference to those who need it most in our community. Thank you so much for making these gifts of assistance possible. We are sharing the love of Christ with those who need to know that they are not forgotten and there is still hope. If you have questions, please reach out to me anytime.

Their specialty is helping pregnant mothers become free from substance abuse.
